"Then I just keep scrolling".

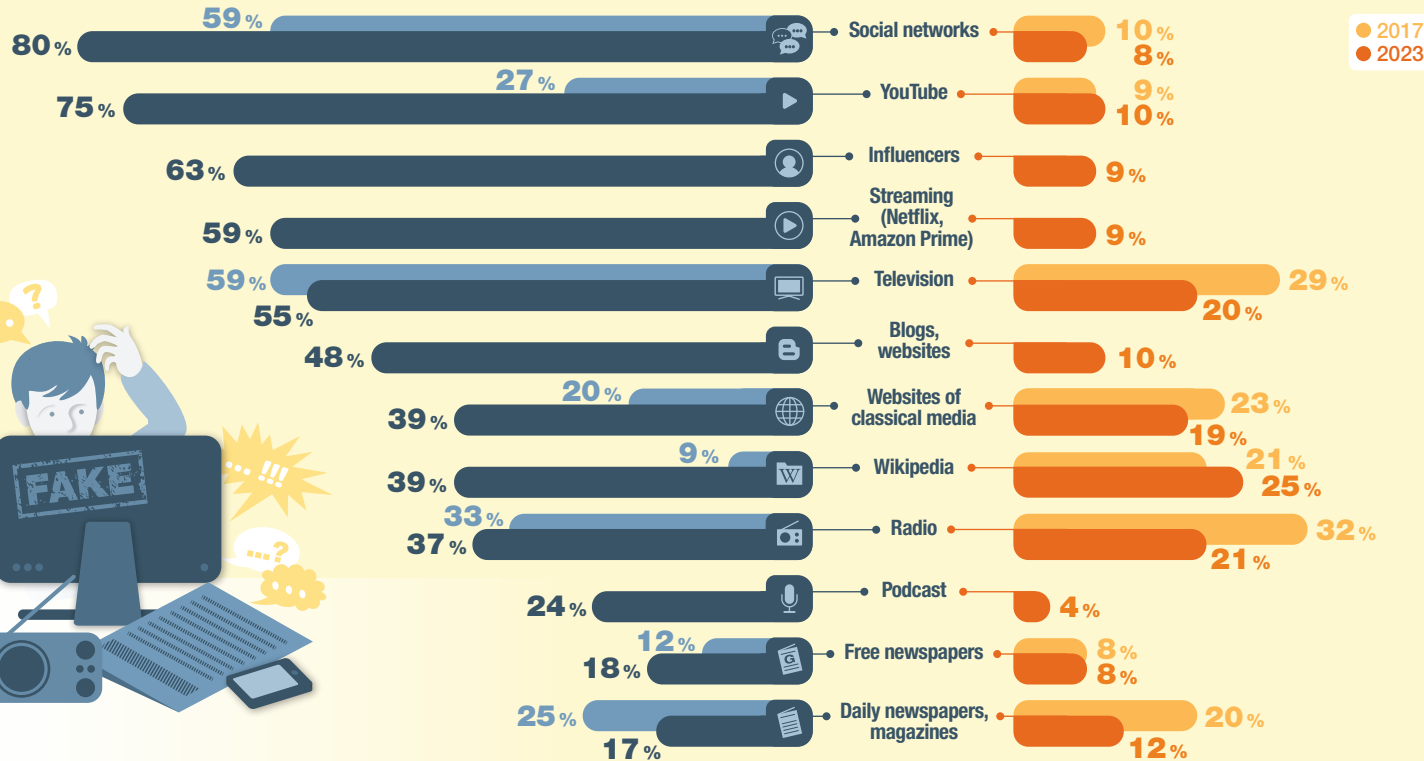

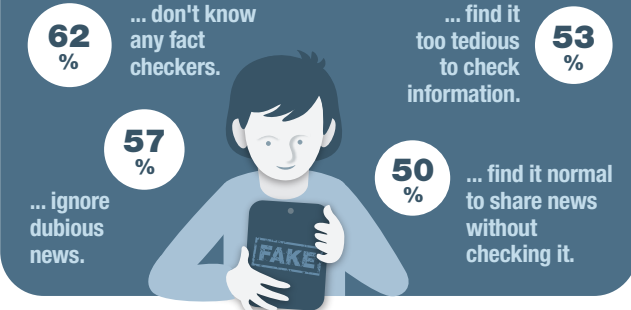

Where do young people get information on current topics (weekly/daily)?

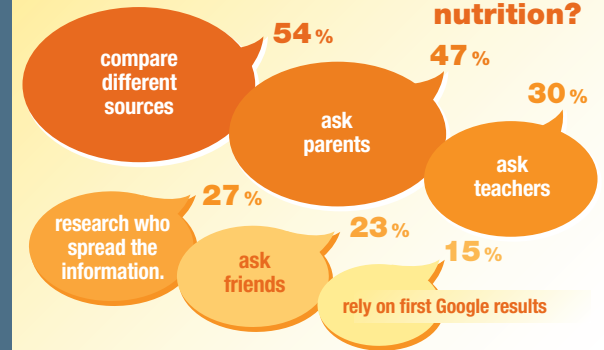
Which news sources do young people consider reliable?

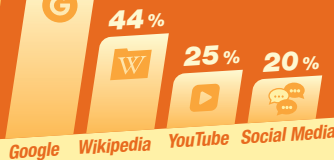


How do young people check information about nutrition?

Sources of information for school:



I only check the information if it is not reliable.

64%

70% of respondents say it is difficult to figure out whether information from the internet is true or false.

11% I never check.

20% I always check.

six qualitative interviews / Nov., Dec. 2016
